50th ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS





67) *Making our bed the other day I was* instructing my partner in the art of envelope corners. "This is the first thing I learnt at Wymondham and I know we all still do them" This snippet of conversation has prompted me to write something I intended to write 18 months ago.

September 1960 West House Girls Susan Burwood, Sarah Coggles, Margie Cornwell, Sheila Ebbons, Kathleen Gascoigne, Stella Haylock, Diana Langley, Judith Lord, Stephanie Randall, Ann Willson Sept 1963 Westminster House 'New Thirds' Sandra Edge, Nicky Dollery, Rosemary Petts Cathy Turton Sep 1965 Anita Dorak (expressed by jumping the 5th and joining us in the 6th) We haven't all been in touch all of the time and I confess I have lost contact with Nicky Dollery completely. Somehow though someone has always been in touch with someone who was in touch with someone else etc. We were obviously a scared and nervous bunch back in 1960, leaving home and starting a new school, and I remember us

deciding to pair up so that we had 'best friends'. Strangely 'mine' by sheer fluke has been a lifetime friendship. Diana Langley was my bridesmaid, my children's Godmother, and recently in London sat with our family as we watched my daughter get married. In 1992 Diana and I travelled to Australia and spent some of our time staying with Sarah Coggles in Brisbane. It was over 20 years since we'd met, but the years soon rolled away and we were gossiping as only women can. In 1983 Ann Willson decided to host a big reunion for us at her home in Newton Flotman. We had lost touch with Susan Burwood and Ann put an ad. in a Hampshire newspaper which was luckily read by one of Susan's friends and she travelled up to join in our day. Letters were sent from Sarah in Australia and Margie in Texas to say they were both thinking of us. In the afternoon we went back to the College and Westminster. When we had started in 1960 there were luxuries such as central heating and divan beds which few of us had at home. by 1983 it still seemed to have exactly the same furniture and my children failed to understand our excitement and thought it really awful. We still meet from time to time and over the years we've had a lot of fun. We've also shared each others heartaches offering not just emotional support but in several cases financial help too. We have tried to give each other encouragement to try new things and pick up the pieces of badly shattered lives. So what am I saying? That in these days of league tables and A-C passes something more important came out of Wymondham. Something I realised was 40 years old last September. I honestly don't know whether we would all agree that we had a great education there even, although we do have a doctor and dentist amongst us. We would all say that some teachers did not have our best interest at heart, but no naming no shaming. Sadly in 1999 Ann Willson died and I would like to dedicate this article to her for getting us all back together again, always having such a positive attitude to everything. There is one more chapter in our story, and a happy one too! Last year Ann's widowed husband married Anita! And of course it is not the end of the story, and who knows with so many years of already living together we'd have no bother in sharing an old folks

She would very much like to get in touch with Joanne Rose. Emba Jones (51-58) has just retired and is now finding time to recall his time at the College. David Tilson (52-60) Head Boy in his last year. He retired in '96 as a Wing Commander with the RAF Engineering Branch and is currently working in the MoD in London. Janet Heathcote (nee Fincham 53-59) is in her last year of teaching and hope to seek out old dorm mates when she retires. She never takes a drive through Norfolk without thinking of Necton - Cora Burton, North Repps - Michael Reynolds, Morston -Ann Rudd, Wymondham - Judy Wright - just names at moment but it would be

lovely to see them again. They spent great times at the College in those early days. Life was fairly bare and not a lot of home comforts but some really good memories of staff and pupils.

Memories of former days...... When David Rudd (53-60) found the website all sorts of memories came flooding back. The Nissen hut beside the grass housed the Tuck Shop in the block known as Admin block which housed the Warden, Dr Mosby his deputy Mr Sanderson and then Mr Wolsey and his deputy Pip Appleyard. He spent his whole seven years in a Nissen hut, Butler 25, 27, 28 and 29 and became head boy of the annexe when the others moved to the new buildings. Amongst his school friends were Richard Bell, Lionel Kett, Laurence and David Burdett (Head Boy) and David Everett with whom he used to train for athletics. He recalls playing rugby against Bob Rowell (known as Skylon because of his height) who played for England. Segregation of the sexes was strictly enforced and he recalls being caned for walking on the girls' playing field after Sunday lunch although there were no girls in sight. On summer evenings at weekends they went to their respective playing field and there was an area of rough grass near the start of the 220 yds straight athletic track which marked the dividing line and known as the Gaza strip. Of the staff he remembers Mr Banham (French) whose nephew Kenin Hayes was in his year; Andrew Sealy (Woodwork/ metalwork) who married Pam Cooper (PE) she used to ride a black bike around college with her name painted on it. Maths was taught by Eric Dudley who went on to do the local weather forecasts on Anglia TV. Jack Hawkvard who cleaned the blackboard with the tatty sleeve of his gown. And of course David Goman (Technical Drawing) and his 3-wheeled Reliant. The sixth form debating society organised a murder trial on one occasion with jury and barristers. The accused was the Irish boilerman who was found guilty of disposing the body in his boiler. The electricity supply to the College was not always reliable during a storm and they had many a tea by candle light and they used to hope that the blackout would last longer so that they did not have to return to the classrooms for prep. Ron Wilson (54-58) started his career in teaching and then ran a residential field studies centre for Northamptonshire CCED. He has

had about 60 books published and says his love of books comes from his many hours on library duty and has to thank his housemaster, Roger Garrard, for the opportunity. Of these books Back Garden Wildlife Sanctuary Book was a best seller and two titles How the Body Works and The Life of Plants were published in the USA and won Outstanding Science Books for Children awards; Mice in the Nature in Close Up series was short -listed for a TES book award. Writing continues to be his hobby and he published Churches in and around Daventry in January 2000. He has also been involved with local radio and produced and presented the Country Air programme for seven years. Paul Rump (56-61) was one of the so called 'late developers'. After graduating he emigrated to Canada and continued his education at University of Calgary with an MA in Geography. His career focused on regional planning, natural resources management and sustainable development and he worked in Saskatchewan Water Resources Commission and Environment Ministry and Environment Canada. This has enabled him to travel widely in Canada including the Arctic as well as globally. He has established his own business offering consulting services in the environment and sustainable development fields, primarily to international organisations such as the UN and European Environment Agency. Sport at the College

Much has happened since I took up the post of Director of Sport in September 1999. Students, both male and female, have continued to excel at inter school and county or national level, ably supported and taught by their enthusiastic and expert staff. The quality and quantity of the sporting

programme is impressive; 673 inter school sports fixtures last year with this figure likely to be exceeded this year, we ran 89 different sports teams, and delivered 3,456 different PE/Sport lessons to all students in the College. A few of the sporting highlights are as follows .

The College 1st XV rugby team progressed to the 3 round of the National Daily Cup in both seasons, going out narrowly to Bishops Stortford 15-13, this season. The under 14, under 15 and under 16 College rugby squads completed an historic "treble" last season when they all became County Champions in their respective age groups. Something, which we believe, might be a "first" for the College rugby sides but some readers may be better informed than us! This remarkable achievement looks set to be repeated this season as the same age group teams have all again progressed to their respective County Cup finals. These will be played on Wednesday 28 February for the U16 and U14 teams and Friday 2nd March for the U15 team. In concluding this brief rugby review it should also noted that the College rugby squads across all the age groups recorded their best season since master in charge of rugby, Roger Morgan, could recall. The future looks bright with 21 College rugby players gaining County "caps" or above last season.

Not to be out done, the ladies did well at hockey (particularly in the junior teams) becoming winners of the Area Tournament at U13 level and runners up of the same tournament at U14, U15 and U16 level. They excelled in Netball last season with all five teams becoming Area Netball Champions in their respective age groups whilst the U16 squad went on to be County league runners up. Again this season looks to be equally successful with two teams already crowned area winners and a third top of their group with matches still to complete. College Netball teams won 64% of their matches last season whilst the hockey players won 48%. The restrictions and limitations of not having our own "Astroturf" make substantial developments in hockey very difficult. Never the less, well done to all the girls.

The junior girl's cross-country team had a marvellous season this year and

progressed from the county championships to represent Norfolk at the regional finals in Bedfordshire back in November. Congratulations also go to the students, who won their "county vests" for cross country by being selected to the Norfolk Team at the recent Anglian Schools', and to those who were selected to be members of the Norfolk Team at the recent Anglian Schools Championships at Northampton. At the Norfolk Schools Team Cross Country Championships the U15 Girls and U15 boys teams won their events. The U13 girls' team was 2nd.

The College has embarked on another "first" by entering the U19 basketball team into the local Sunday evening men' league. Although initially this is quite demanding the students have responded magnificently and have improved beyond recognition, in no small part due to their coach Mr. Barnsley's expertise and knowledge.

In May 2000 the College was reawarded the prestigious "Sports mark" Gold award by Sport England. We were 1 of only 3 schools in the county who achieved this standard, which is a mark of recognition of a high quality and varied curricular and extra curricular PE/Sport programme. All involved in the PE/Sport programme at the College richly deserve this coveted award. Football at the College is blossoming and programmes are being established to develop it to the standard and quality of the existing rugby programme. Changes have already been rapid. Fixtures have increased by nearly 80% over two seasons; teams have been entered into the Norwich Schools' League with the U15 side unbeaten and the 1st XI are currently unbeaten in their inaugural season of the Region's Independent Schools' League with matches still to play. Outside coaches support the College coaching staff and girl's football teams are also run at U14, U13 and U19 levels. We also have 3 boys playing for the County U16 and 2 for County U19.

Other initiatives are that there are now two GSCE PE groups in year 10 and year 11 plus twelve Advanced level PE/Sport students in year 12 and year 13. The sports hall, gym, squash court and corridors have recently undergone a redecoration programme and the long awaited resurfacing of the tarmac sports

Finally, plans have been made to organise an Wymondham College PE/Sports Presentation Evening sometime in May/June to celebrate the years sporting achievements and Radio


